

## **Beirut 1 Voters: Don't fall for March 14's false claims to protecting Christians!**

If March 14 wins 71 deputies (VERY BEST SCENARIO, ALL THE CANDIDATES WON)

Lebanese Forces will get 6 deputies.

Kataeb will get 6 deputies.

Independents (on 14 Feb lists) will get 4 deputies.

Jumblat will get 17 deputies.

Future Movement will get 38 deputies.

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## **Don't fall for the fear mongering tactics of March 14, used to scare Christians of Shiites candidates:**

- A deep schism currently exists within Islam between Sunnis and Shiites.
- The number of Sunnis in the world is 6 times higher than that of the Shiites.
- In the neighborhood of Lebanon, the Shiites are the majority in Iran, Iraq and Yemen.
- In the neighborhood of Lebanon, the Sunnis are the majority in Turkey, Syria, Kuwait, water, Egypt, Qatar, Saudi Arabia.
- The Shiites are very committed to Lebanon and are isolated because we are surrounded by Sunni regimes; Hezb is deeply convinced that, given the Sunni extremists threat Christians are its best allies.
- Iranians do not like the Lebanese Shiites because they are Arab, their support is only tactical.
- Hezb leaders have repeated for the last few years that they no longer aim for an Islamic republic in Lebanon.

They must also know that:

- The fundamentalist Sunni militias in Lebanon (some from 1948) are involved in almost all the killings and attacks that took place on our territory against the Lebanese army, against civilians and against Hezbollah officials.
- Most are supported and funded mainly by Saudi Arabia.
- Several Sunni detainees charged by Lebanese authorities have been released before their trial, on demand for some of our Sunni parliament members.
- The militias often take refuge in the Palestinian camps.
- They are numerous:
  - Muslim Brotherhood (Jamaa Islamiya)
  - Hezb El Tahrir (Islamic Liberation)
  - Islamic Unification Movement
  - Ahbash
  - Salafi (Jund el Cham, Jund Allah, Fath el Islam)
  - Wahhabi militia
  - Osbat El Ansari
  - Al Qaeda

They are all fundamentals, extremely dangerous, and frightening.
